Out of the divider most of the water flows out blue, but one small leak trickles into a small pool that is red to signify it is a Maaori Provider. The second stream under "Whaikaha" flows through a under the label "NASCs" which has a small red dot on it to signify the one NASC with Māori ownership, Taikura Trust, and then down into a dam labelled "IF Hosts". Three small leaks trickle into three small pools. Two are blue. One of the pools is red to signify it is a Maaori Provider.

The "Other" concrete sided river is the largest and flows under down under the heading "Whatu Ora" which then splits into three concrete sided streams. The first stream is labelled "Over 65". It flows down under a final concrete divider labelled NASCs out of which most of the water flows out blue, but one small leak trickles into a small pool that is red to signify it is a Maaori Provider. The second stream is labelled "Chronic". It flows down under a final concrete divider labelled "NASCs" which has a small red dot on it to signify the one NASC with Māori ownership, Taikura Trust, out of which most of the water flows out blue, but one small leak trickles into a small pool that is red to signify it is a Maaori Provider. The Third stream is the largest of all the streams, it flows under a final concrete divider labelled Hospital Nurse out of

which most of the water flows out blue, but one small leak trickles into a small pool that is red to signify it is a Maaori Provider.
